
We have a great dedicated crew and we invite other members to join us each Tuesday morning.

### Albert Carleton Striplin



### September 5, 1953—August 27, 2024

Albert Carleton Striplin, 70, of Prattville, Alabama passed away peacefully at his home on August 27, 2024. From his birth on September 5, 1953, Mr. Striplin has been a lifelong resident of Prattville. Albert spent his life serving the community of Prattville through church and civic groups. He was elected to the Prattville City Council in 2011 and before his death was serving his third term. He graduated from Autauga County High School in 1971, earned a B.S. in Finance from the University of Alabama, and attended LSU School of Banking. He retired from the Bank of Prattville after more than 35 years as Director and President, and President of Key Finance Co., Inc. for 30 years, before its closing in 2015. An active member of Prattville First Methodist Church, he served in the choir and as a pianist for the Fellowship Sunday School Class. He was also an active serving member of Eagle Scout (Troop #25) and Master Gardener with more than 8,000 volunteer hours. Mr. Striplin served the community through the following organizations: Prattville Area Chamber of Commerce Economic Development Committee, Autauga Area Community Foundation, Central Alabama Community Foundation, Leadership Autauga County, Leadership Alabama, Prattville Kiwanis Club, Prattville YMCA, and Historic Prattville Redevelopment Authority. His legacy of community service with the utmost integrity and fairness to all is an inspiration to his family and friends.

### Gardening Tips

#### October

- Plant new trees and shrubs in the landscape.
- Start mulching all shrubs that do not have a mulch.
- Continue insect and disease control practices on roses.
- Clean up flower beds immediately after first killing frost. Plant half-hardy annuals, such as snapdragons.
- Plant tulip, hyacinth, daffodil, crocus, Dutch iris, anemone, and ranunculus. Watch planting depth.
- Dig caladiums, clean and store in a warm place.
- Spray with oils before freezing weather to kill scale, mites, etc.
- Central and South: Continue planting winter-hardy crops such as beets, carrots, collards, kale, parsley, and spinach.
- Whole state: Continue planting winter-hardy transplants.

#### November

- Start mulching strawberries, blackberries, and grapes.
- Plant shrubs, trees, and vines.
- Perform a soil test to determine if lime is recommended and apply anytime this fall to your lawn.
- Get rose plantings underway.
- Plant hardy annuals such as larkspur, poppies, pansies, bugloss, candytuft, and ornamental cabbage and kale.
- Plant sweet peas into the ground.

• Continue spring bulb planting. Use cold frames for tender, cool-season vegetables such as broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, Swiss chard, lettuce, mustard, onions, radishes, and turnips.

#### December

- Put dormant oil sprays for scale on fruit trees.
- Planting trees and shrubs is still the main activity but delay in case of freezing weather.
- Get your soil tested and be prepared for spring gardening.
- Dig out wild garlic, chickweed, *Poa annua*, dandelion, and other winter weeds before they flower. You can even mow and bag your lawn clippings to help eradicate these winter weeds.
- Plant hardy annual seed and perennials without delay.
- Continue spring bulb planting.

### **ACMGA Intern Class**






